Mine rescue teams to compete

Nine metal and nonmetal mine rescue teams from Colorado, Montana, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming will compete in the National Metal and Nonmetal Mine Rescue Contest on Aug. 24 at the Las Vegas Convention Center.

Sponsored by the U.S. Labor Department's Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA), the contest will pit the top 33 mine rescue teams in the mining industry against each other to select the finest teams in the nation.

A panel of judges will evaluate each team as it performs a practical mine rescue problem in a simulated mine environment designed to approximate the actual conditions that might be encountered in a mine fire, flood, explosion or other mine emergency.
